2.00	Church	First service. Singing. Two monks make sure no one falls asleep. Older monks can support themselves on a misericord, a kind of ledge on the choir seats.
2.45	Cloisters	Reading
3.00	Church	Service to celebrate daybreak
3.15	Cloisters	Reading out loud to other monks.
4.00	Church	Short service to mark the first hour of the day.
4.15	Chapter House	Reading by the Abbot from the rule book. Faults confessed and punishments given. Announcements. Tasks for the day given out.
4.45		Monks leave to start their tasks.
7.30	Cloisters	More reading
8.00	Church	Service, which once a week includes Mass.
9.00	Cloisters	Reading, washing, shaving, limited conversation.

11.00	Church	Service
11.30	Refectory	Dinner
12.00		Nap time and reading
14.00	Church	Service. More singing
14.30		Back to work.
18.00	Church	Last Service
18.30	Refectory	Supper

20.00	Dormitory	Bed time






Activity 3

Not everything in a monastery was work and prayer. In some monasteries there was time for board games such as chess, draughts and one called fox and geese. A popular game was called merels or nine men's morris. These pictures show a merels board scratched on stone at Dryburgh Abbey and another found by archaeologists at Jedburgh Abbey. Merels is a little like Noughts and Crosses (OXO).





Work in pairs. Make a merels board by copying the diagram below. To make the men, draw circles about the size of a 2p piece on cardboard. Draw 9 each and cut them out. Colour one set or mark them so that each player has their own set. What do you think the monks used for men? Play the game.

Nine Men's Morris /Merels – board game for two players.

Rules:

Each player has 9 men.

The aim is to make rows of three men in a straight line.

One player starts by placing a man on any of the black circles on the board.

The other player can then place one of theirs.

When all the men are on the board, you can move any one of your men to a neighbouring circle.

Each time you make a row, you can remove one of the other player's men.

The game ends when one player is unable to move or has only 2 men left.
